My dear parishioners,

The first picnic-planning meeting of the year was held this past Wednesday evening. A representative number of parishioners attended, along with this year's triumvirate of chairmen: Charyl Nagy, Joe Petro and Liz Tomko. The purpose of this initial meeting was to determine if we are going to have a picnic this year, when it will be and for which duration of time. After an open and thorough discussion, a vote was taken among all those present and a very clear majority selected:

2025 POLISH PICNIC - FRIDAY, June 27, 5 to 9 p.m. & SATURDAY, June 28, 5 to 9 p.m.

There is a clear desire to maintain our annual picnic as primarily an ethnic food festival that is family-friendly and lasts two days, corresponding with the Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. I invite all parishioners to attend the next picnic meeting on Wednesday, February 12, at 6 p.m. in the church hall. Come to this meeting to learn more about the positive changes taking place to our picnic. The chairmen are currently in search of volunteers to help work the picnic. Please let them know early that they can count on you to help with the many tasks required to run a successful picnic.

The Christmas Crib remains in our church until Candlemas. It can be found near the BVM side altar. Falling exactly 40 days after Christmas, Candlemas was observed as the official end of Christmas in medieval times. In some countries it is not unusual to retain some Christmas decorations until Candlemas on Feb. 2. Pope St. John Paul II would make his last visit to the crib in St. Peter's Square after celebrating the evening Mass on Feb. 2. After this visit the Nativity scene was dismantled. Consider making a visit to our crib this year!

The Church celebrates the solemn Feast of the Presentation of the Lord on Feb. 2. This feast recalls the day on which Jesus Christ was presented in the temple by Mary and Joseph. This feast, also commemorated as the Fourth Joyful Mystery of the Rosary, celebrates Jesus as the Light of revelation to all the nations. According to ancient tradition, candles are blessed on this day, both those used in the church and the home. In accordance with the liturgy for the day, special candles will be blessed at Mass for the faithful to take home and use. Families have customarily lit them at the table for Easter and Christmas dinner, for sacramental visits of Holy Communion and Holy Anointing, and for blessed protection in lightning storms and power outages. The candles will be blessed in a special ritual with a procession at the 4:00 p.m. Mass on Saturday, February 2. The blessed candles may be obtained after the Mass for a donation of \$4 for a box of two "Candlemas" candles.

The Church celebrates the *Feast of St. Blaise* on Feb. 3. He was bishop of Sebaste in Armenia in the fourth century. Before being martyred, he is said to have healed a boy who was choking. He is venerated today as the patron of those who suffer from diseases of the throat. Using candles blessed the day before at the Mass of the Presentation of the Lord, the faithful will be blessed through the intercession of St. Blaise. Throats will be blessed after all weekend Masses February 1/2, as well as on February 3.

Collection for victims of the Los Angeles wildfires: All parishes in the Diocese of Scranton are being asked to take up a special second collection to benefit the fire victims in need of desperate assistance. The funds raised will be donated directly to Catholic Charities USA – the official domestic relief agency of the Catholic Church in the United States. As usual, 100% of funds raised will go directly to local agencies in the affected areas who are offering emergency and long-term relief to those who have been displaced or are suffering because of the wildfires. We will take a second collection for the L.A, fire victims after the distribution of Holy Communion at all Masses this weekend.

Requiescant in pace: pray for the peaceful repose of the souls of Harry Lyons, Joseph Mihalka, and Violet Roman who were recently buried from our church. Violet was our oldest parishioner, aged 106 years at her passing.

We express gratitude to our Confraternity of Christian Mothers, who recently presented a check at their Wafer Dinner in the amount of \$4,500 for our Building Fund. This gift comes from their fundraising efforts during the past year. Thank you, ladies!

Parish families are needed to bring up the gifts of bread and wine in the offertory procession for the weekend Masses. Would you consider accepting this honor? At least two volunteers are needed for each of the weekend Masses. The ushers will continue to bring up the collection basket. Please go to the back of the church as soon as the ushers begin taking up the collection (this helps to expedite things without unnecessary delay!). You may place your offertory envelope directly into the main collection basket. Pick up the ciborium and the cruet from the table and wait near the front entrance to the church. As soon as the ushers return from collecting the contributions, walk down the aisle behind the usher carrying the basket. Upon approaching the sanctuary, give the priest the gifts, then bow to the altar once the priest moves to return to the altar. Return to your pew by walking back down a side aisle. Perhaps you could volunteer at a Mass that is being offered for your family members?

During winter months our health is always a concern, and we need to take precautions. Regarding the Sign of Peace, you are asked to please use your common sense. If you are not feeling well or are taking medicine for the flu, a cold, etc., a nod of the head with a smile or just a kind word is sufficient if you do not wish to shake hands.
